A Traditional Welsh fly that has been around for a long time and can be fished all season, either as a Dry (or weighted) a wet. Indeed I caught my largest Grayling (4 and half pound) on a weighted grey duster near my home town of Llanidloes on the upper Severn. In smaller sizes it can represent a Caenis or midge, larger sizes a May-fly or Moth.



Dressing

Hook Dry fly size 10-18 (or even smaller). Body Blue/grey rabbit under fur.

Thread Black 8ought Uni thread (some use Hackle Well marked badger cock hackle.

brown).

Tail Optional (as original was tail less).

5-6 badger cock hackles fibres.



Step 1Set hook in vice (ping it) and catch on tying thread.



Step 2Remove waste tag and run tying thread down hook shank to point above hook barb.



Step 3

Dub Blue /grey rabbit under-fur onto tying thread (a little at a time)...



Step 4 ...and produce a nice even carrot shaped body.



Step 5Prepare a well marked Silver badger feather...



Step 6 ...and tie it in (shine'y side facing you).



Step 7 Advance tying thread to eye...



Step 8 ...and wind hackle, with hackle pliers, 4 or 5 turns.



Step 9Secure hackle, remove waste, pull back hackle fibres and form a small neat head with tying thread...



Step 10 ...and whip finish.

Note: Add a touch of varnish to head to secure wraps.



The Other Side



Step 13: If you wish to add a tail to your fly (as I do) then... ... after stage 2, secure 5 to 6 hackle fibres to hook shank and bind them down, returning tying thread to tail.



Step 14Dub on grey under fur and create body...



Step 15 ...and complete fly as in previous steps.
